DHOUAT BREWSTER. Of the numerous early saulers of Walworth county, who have died since our last meeting may be hamed Deodat Brewster. He emigrated from Vermont with his family in 1838 ar ettled in the old precinct of Geneva when it comprehended one fourth of the county. He entered his land on section I, where he resided till his death, October 28, 1881, in his 93d yearone of the first settlers and perhaps the oldest person in the county, -His wife had died some nine vears previous. He very successfully opened and cultivated 280 acres of land and has left the family of his only son on the old homestend. The writer settled in his neighborhood some 40 years ago and ever found him a good neighbor and a man of integrity. Mr. Brewster was a man of distinct personalily and valued a laboring man who earned his bread and paid his debts more than lofty officials or professionals or even splendid bankers or hunkrupts. He psually took a common sense view of matters about .lini without soliciting the applaase of the multitude. With temperate habits and . . preserving industry he acquired a property and found a good old age, retaining his mental faculties almost to the last.







Deodat Brewster and his wife Lois Drury Brewster seem to have moved from Pittsford, Rutland, Vermont to Geneva, Walworth Wisconsin sometime around 1837. They had four known children

Mary S. Brewster b. Feb 1816 German Franklin Brewster b. 27 Feb 1820 Sarah Augusta Brewster b. 11 oct 1824 Eliza C. Brewster b. Jun 1827

Deodat is a direct-line ancestor of Elder William Brewster of the Mayflower.
